It's summertime. What are you going to do with the kids? Are you staying in Tucson or traveling? Do you have a camp in mind for your child with disabilities? Activities for all of the kids? Yourself?

In this issue of the Navigator I will offer suggestions for fun activities for the kids. Some are free, some have a small fee.

Your child may qualify for a summer DDD program. Check with your support coordinator regarding eligibility and available programs. Most are already full, but your service coordinator may be able to help.



Summer is the ideal time to update records. Go through all the boxes of IEP's and other educational information and keep only the most important information. Label it school year 2013-14. Start a new folder/box for 2014-15, because that school year will be here before you know it. Try to determine where your child still needs work on skills, make a list of topics to discuss with the teacher or specialists when school starts again. If you don't write it down, you will forget. Also, if you see any issues over the summer that are concerning and might effect educational advancement, write them down.

Go through medical records and consolidate/organize them also. We accumulate so much paper having children with special needs that it can become overwhelming.

Your child is getting ready to turn 18. Do you have guardianship yet? It is time to educate yourself on the various ways guardianship can be accomplished. We will be having a training on June 7th at the Children's Clinics (see the flyer later in the newsletter with details). We hope to have other workshops on behavior, testing and other educational issues over the summer for you to strengthen your advocacy skills.

The summer is a time to relax, but also a time to organize and get your thought together. I do my best thinking sitting on a recliner in my backyard under an umbrella with the warm, "dry" heat blowing across me. Enjoy!!!

Hello Arizona Schools:

Parents have the right to disagree with an IEP

What happens when the school makes a recommendation that the parent disagrees with? Parents are entitled to full participation in their child's educational plan. That means they have a say in determining what, if any, accommodations or specialized services their student receives. When a plan is developed, the parent has the options to either agree with the plan, reject the plan or even agree with part of the plan and reject the rest. At that point, if the school and the parent are in disagreement, the parent can petition the Department of Education for a hearing or some other type of assistance in resolving the dispute such as mediation. The parent can also request that the school provide for an independent evaluation.

If a parent chooses to have an independent evaluation done, do they have to pay for it themselves? Not always. The burden of paying for the independent evaluation is determined by state regulation and is based on a sliding scale. Parents whose income is over, under 400% of the federal poverty guidelines, do not have to pay any portion of the cost. If their income is between 400% and 600% of the guidelines, they will have to pay a portion of the fee and for those who earn over 600% of the guidelines will have to pay for all of it. Students who qualify for free or reduced lunch are automatically entitled to an evaluation at the school districts expense.

Additional free trainings this Summer...

ARIZONA YOUTH LEADERSHIP FORUM

**FOR STUDENTS WHO HAVE DISABILITIES
(AZYLF)**

A unique program for future community leaders

What is the AZYLF? It is an innovative, intensive five-day training program for rising high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors who have disabilities. It includes career awareness and leadership development information to assist young people who have disabilities to reach their potential. The training is presented in a fun, entertaining, and educational format.

Who Participates in the AZ Youth Leadership Forum? Young people who have disabilities and who demonstrate leadership potential, academic success, involvement in extra-curricular activities (such as sports, the arts, or service), community involvement and the ability to interact effectively with other students.

How does the forum happen? Approximately 20 high school students are selected to attend through a competitive process. The event successfully integrates students who represent the disability and ethnic diversity of our state. The Forum is held in June 2014, in Phoenix, Az.

It costs nothing for the student delegates to attend the Forum. Costs are approximately \$1500.00 per student, not including thousands of dollars for services and goods provided in-kind by volunteer supports.

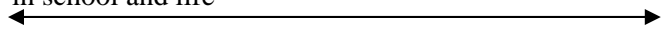

RANKING NAMES BEST STATES FOR DISABILITY SERVICES

An annual ranking of states offering the best services for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities reveals a familiar but evolving landscape. The analysis of disability services in all 50 states and the District of Columbia being released Thursday by United Cerebral Palsy finds top performers spanning the map. In previous years, the best services were largely clustered in the Northeast and West.

Arizona claimed the number one slot in the ranking for the third year in a row. Also rounding out the 10 best on this year's list are Michigan, Hawaii, Georgia, New York, South Carolina, Maine, Massachusetts, Ohio and Missouri.

The analysis factors each state's approach to promoting independence and productivity, ensuring quality and safety, keeping families together and reaching people in need. Nationally, almost 317,000 people remain on waiting lists for home and community-based services, according to the report, which is largely based on data from 2012, the most recent year available. Some 38 states have one-third or more of their residents with developmental disabilities working in competitive employment, the report found. As in past year, top-tier services were found in both big and small states, those with rich and poor demographics, jurisdictions with high and low taxes, as well as, those with varying levels of per-person spending on disability services.

EXTENDED SCHOOL YEAR (ESY)

What are Extended School Year (ESY) services? Extended school year services are special education and related services that are provided to a child with a disability beyond the normal school year, are in accordance with a child's IEP, are provided at no cost to the parents, and are in alignment with the standards set by the state education agency (SEA). The regulations that implement the IDEA require IEP teams to determine, on an individual basis, whether ESY services are necessary to provide a FAPE to the child. (FAPE Free Appropriate Public Education). "Student participation in an ESY program is not compulsory.

Eligibility for ESY services shall be determined no later than 45 calendar days prior to the last day of the school year.

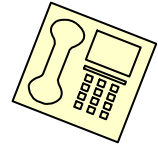

Three Years of Support for Self-Advocates & Family Members

Word of the LEAP program is getting around. Each program year there has been an increase in the number of individuals applying for LEAP scholarships and an increase in the number of individuals the LEAP program has been able to assist in attending valuable learning events.

The LEAP program will be wrapping up year 3 on June 30th. During this year, Pilot Parents has received over 70 scholarship applications and has been able to approve over 55 awards. We are happy to report that the LEAP program consistently receives very positive survey results with all event attendees reporting an increase in advocacy skills.

One LEAP awardee recently wrote, “I applied to the LEAP program and was granted a full scholarship to go to Denver. Without Pilot Parents of Southern Arizona and more specifically without the LEAP program I am certain that I would not have been able to attend the National Conference for Childhood Apraxia of Speech. At the conference I met at least 100 parents of children that all had Apraxia. We were no longer alone. With the grant from LEAP I gained knowledge that cannot be bought and also the motivation to fight for my son and advocate for his rights.”
